23rd Bimstec Day: Bimstec leaders for joint efforts to combat Covid-19 impact

The 23rd Bay of Bengal Initiative for Multi-Sectoral Technical and Economic Cooperation (Bimstec) Day will be observed on Saturday.

This year, due to the Covid-19 pandemic, there will be no event to celebrate the day, according to a press release issued on Friday.

To mark the day, the heads of states and governments, and foreign ministers of Bimstec member nations' have issued separate messages.

In her message, Bangladesh Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina said she was delighted to extend the warmest felicitations to the governments and the people of the Bimstec member states on the occasion of 23rd Bimstec Day.

"I am pleased to observe that Bimstec has come a long way in its commitment to harness shared and accelerated growth through intimate cooperation in different areas of common interests," Sheikh Hasina said. "I firmly believe that Bimstec will advance in an accelerated pace towards making a peaceful, prosperous and sustainable Bay of Bengal region, as we agreed in the 4th Bimstec Summit along with the Bimstec leaders," she added.

"The Covid-19 pandemic posed a serious challenge. It will leave longlasting multiple impacts on the lives and living of people of this region, causing repercussions in the economic and social progress.

"Bimstec forum provides an excellent platform to combat the devastating impact of Covid-I9. We should not leave any stone unturned to utilize this platform in addressing the challenges of the post-Covid-19 era," the Bangladesh prime minister added.

In his message, Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi said: "Over the years, Bimstec has proved to be an effective bridge between South and Southeast Asia, reinforcing the traditional bonds of mutual goodwill and shared cultural heritage.

"The continued strengthening of Bimstec in recent times has brought our countries even closer together with the common objective of building a more secure and prosperous Bay of Bengal region," Modi said.

Bangladesh Foreign Minister Dr AK Abdul Momen, in his message, said: "Since its inception in 1997, Bimstec has been working to advance the common visions and shared endeavours of the Bay of Bengal region. Hosting of the Bimstec Secretariat in Dhaka is the manifestation of Bangladesh's firm commitment to the Bimstec process."
